About DB Server

DB Server provides the interface between Genesys applications and the database management system on which the databases for the operations of Genesys solutions reside.

Intended Audience

This document is primarily intended for system administrators and database architects. It has been written with the assumption that you have a basic understanding of:

- Computer-telephony integration (CTI) concepts, processes, terminology, and applications
- Network design and operation
- Your own network configurations

You should also be familiar with:

- Genesys Framework architecture and functions.
- The Genesys configuration environment, including basic operations in Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager.

- **Note:** Before deploying DB Server, you must install DBMS client software on the DB Server host computer. Refer to the DBMS vendor's documentation for details. This document also provides some specific recommendations in Chapter 2 on page 27.

Introduction

Within the Framework architecture, DB Server provides the interface between Genesys applications and the database management system (DBMS) you are using to manage the databases required to operate a Genesys solution.

DB Server can run in two modes, as follows:

- Independent of Configuration Server—DB Server provides Configuration Server with access to the Configuration Database; reads its configuration settings from a configuration file.
- As a Configuration Server client—DB Server provides access to various databases, which means you must configure Database Access Points (DAPs). DB Server can therefore be a client of applications other than

Configuration Server. In this mode, DB Server reads its configuration settings via Configuration Server from the Configuration Database.

This chapter contains instructions for installing and configuring DB Server as a client of Configuration Server, and its associated DAPs. For instructions on installing DB Server to run independently of Configuration Server, refer to the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*.

Note: For the rest of this document, the term *DB Server* means *DB Server* as a client of Configuration Server.

DB Server Failure

Starting in release 8.0, the Management Layer can now use hang-up detection to detect an unresponsive DB Server application. Users can then configure appropriate actions, including alarms if required.

To enable hang-up detection for DB Server, use the configuration option heartbeat-period to set the time interval in which a heartbeat message must be received before DB Server is considered to be unresponsive. Use the option hangup-restart to define the action that Management Layer takes when it deems DB Server to be non-responsive, either automatically restarting DB Server or just generating a notification of the situation.

For more information about this functionality, see the *Framework 8.1 Management Layer User's Guide*. For more information about the configuration options, refer to the *Framework 8.1 Configuration Options Reference Manual*.

Warning! Use this functionality with great care. Failure to use it properly could result in unexpected behavior, from ignoring the options to an unexpected restart of the application.

What Is a Database Access Point?

To cover the variety of ways in which you can interface applications in the Genesys installation with databases, the Configuration Layer uses the concept of a Database Access Point.

A *Database Access Point* (DAP) is an object of the Application type that describes both the parameters required for communication with a particular database and the parameters of DB Server through which this database can be accessed. If, according to your configuration, a database can be accessed through multiple DB Servers simultaneously, register as many DAPs as there are DB Servers.

This chapter describes how to configure a DAP when you use DB Server to access a database. When you configure a DAP for DB Server, configure only the fields applicable to a DB Server connection.

Note: No physically installed applications correspond to DAPs.

Configuring DB Server

For a DB Server to function as a client of Configuration Server, you must configure an Application object of type DB Server, using Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager.

Procedure: Configuring a client DB Server Application object using Genesys Administrator

Purpose: To configure DB Server to function as a client of Configuration Server.

Prerequisites

- Genesys Administrator is installed and running.
- The Host object upon which this DB Server will reside has been configured. Refer to the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide* to obtain instructions for configuring Host objects.
- A database exists to which this DB Server will provide access.

Start of procedure

- In Genesys Administrator, go to Provisioning > Environment > Applications, and select New in the toolbar. This opens a Browse dialog box that lists the available application templates. If a DB Server template file is not listed, do one of the following:
 - Import the DBServer_<current-version>.apd file from the Management Framework 8.1 product CD.
 - Create a new template using the instructions provided in the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*, and repeat this step.
- 2. In the Browse dialog box, select the DB Server template file. The Configuration tab for the new DB Server Application object appears in the Details panel.
- 3. In the General section, enter a descriptive name in the Name field
- 4. In the Server Info section:
 - **a.** In the Host field, click the magnifying glass icon to select the Host object on which this DB Server is running.
 - **b.** For each listening port that an application must use to connect to this DB Server:
 - i. In the Connections list, click Add.
 - **ii.** Enter the port properties in the Port Info dialog box. To secure connections to this port, refer to the *Genesys Security Deployment Guide*.
 - iii. Click OK.

- c. For the Working Directory, Command Line, and Command Line Arguments fields, do one of the following:
 - Enter the appropriate information in the three text boxes. For information about command-line parameters, see the *Framework* 8.1 Deployment Guide.
 - Type a period (.) in the Working Directory and Command Line text boxes, and leave the Command Line Arguments text box blank. The information will be filled in automatically when you install this DB Server, but only if the Installation Package can connect to Configuration Server.
- 5. On the Options tab:
 - **a.** In the drop-down list in the top-right corner, select Advanced View (Options) if not already selected.
 - **b.** In the dbserver section:
 - i. Change the value of the dbprocess_name option to the value of the option <DBMS you are using>_name. For example, if you are using Microsoft SQL Server DBMS, set the value of dbprocess_name to ./dbclient_msql.
 - **ii.** Change the value of the management-port option to the management port number for this DB Server.
 - c. Change existing, or define new, configuration options as required. For option descriptions, see Chapter 3 on page 33 and Chapter 5 on page 45.
- 6. Click Save and Close to save the new DB Server Application object.

End of procedure

Procedure:

Configuring a client DB Server Application object using Configuration Manager

Purpose: To configure DB Server to function as a client of Configuration Server.

Prerequisites

- Configuration Manager is installed and running.
- The Host object upon which this DB Server will reside has been configured. Refer to the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide* to obtain instructions for configuring Host objects.
- A database exists to which this DB Server will provide access.

Start of procedure

- In Configuration Manager, right-click the Environment > Applications folder and select New > Application, which opens the Browse dialog box that lists the available application templates. If a DB Server template file is not listed, do one of the following:
 - Import the DBServer_<current-version>.apd file from the Management Framework 8.1 product CD.
 - Create a new template using the instructions provided in the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*, and repeat this step.
- 2. In the Browse dialog box, select the DB Server template file, which opens the Properties dialog box for the new DB Server Application object.
- 3. On the General tab, enter a descriptive name in the Name text box
- 4. On the Server Info tab:
 - **a.** Click the Browse button next to the Host drop-down list, and select the host on which this DB Server will run.
 - **b.** For each listening port to which clients can connect to this DB Server:
 - i. In the Ports section, click Add Port. The Port's Properties dialog box opens.
 - **ii.** Specify the Port ID and the Communication Port that applications will use to connect to this DB Server.
 - iii. To secure connections to this port, refer to the *Genesys Security Deployment Guide*.
 - c. Leave the rest of the fields at their default values.
- 5. On the Start Info tab, do one of the following:
 - Enter the appropriate information in the three text boxes. For information about command-line parameters, see the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*.
 - Type a period (.) in the Working Directory and Command Line text boxes, and leave the Command Line Arguments text box blank. The information will be filled in automatically when you install this DB Server, but only if the Installation Package can connect to Configuration Server.
- 6. On the Options tab, in the dbserver section:
 - a. Change the value of the dbprocess_name option to the value corresponding to the <DBMS you are using>_name option. For example, if you are using Microsoft SQL Server DBMS, set the value dbprocess_name to ./dblient_msql.
 - **b.** Change the value of the management-port option to the number of the management port for this DB Server.
 - c. Change existing, or define new, configuration options as required. For option descriptions, see Chapter 3 on page 33 and Chapter 5 on page 45.

7. Click OK.

End of procedure

Configuring Database Access Points

For any application to access the Database, you must configure one or more Database Application Points (DAP) as Application objects, using Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager.

Procedure: Configuring a Database Access Point for a Client DB Server using Genesys Administrator

Prerequisites

- DB Server is installed and running.
- Genesys Administrator is installed and running.

Start of procedure

- In Genesys Administrator, go to Provisioning > Environment > Applications, and select New in the toolbar. This opens a Browse dialog box with a list of available application templates. If a Database Access Point template file is not listed, do one of the following:
 - Import the Database_Access_Point_<current-version>.apd file from the Management Framework 8.1 product CD.
 - Create a new template using the instructions provided in the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*, and repeat this step.
- 2. In the Browse dialog box, select the DAP template file. The Configuration tab for the new DAP Application object appears in the Details panel.
- 3. In the General section, enter a descriptive name in the Name field.

A DAP can have the same name as the database itself. However, it is recommended that you make their names unique if you are using multiple access points for the same database.

- 4. In the Host field of the Server Info section, click the magnifying glass icon to select the Host object to which this DAP is assigned.
- 5. In the DB Info section, provide information about the database in the following fields:
 - Connection Type—The type of connection to the DBMS. Select Default.

Note: Do not select a Connection Type of JDBC for Database Access Points.

• DB Server—The Application object corresponding to the database to which this DAP will provide access.

Note: A DAP has the same listening ports as the DB Server to which it provides access.

- DBMS Name—The name or alias identifying the DBMS that handles the database. The value of this option is communicated to DB Server so that it connects to the correct DBMS:
 - For DB2, set this value to the name or alias-name of the database specified in the db2 client configuration.
 - For Informix, this value is the name of SQL server, specified in the sqlhosts file.
 - For Microsoft SQL, set this value to the SQL server name (usually the same as the host name of the computer on which Microsoft SQL runs).
 - For Oracle, the value is the name of the Listener service.
 - For PostgreSQL, set this value to the SQL server name (usually the same as the host name of the computer on which PostgreSQL runs).
 - For Sybase, this value is the server name stored in the Sybase interface file.
- DBMS Type—The type of DBMS that handles the database. You must set a value for this property.
- Database Name—The name of the database to be accessed, as it is specified in the DBMS that handles this database. You must set a value for this property unless oracle or db2 is specified as the DBMS Type. For Sybase, Informix, and Microsoft SQL, this value is the name of the database to which the client will connect.
- User Name—The user name established in the SQL server to access the database. You must set a value for this property.
- User Password—The password established in the SQL server to access the database.
- Re-enter Password—Confirmation for the value entered for Password.
- Case Conversion—Case conversion method for key names of key-value lists coming from DB Server. This value specifies whether and how a client application converts the field names of a database table when receiving data from DB Server. If you select upper, field names are converted into uppercase; if you select Lower, field names are converted into lowercase; and if you select any, field names are not

converted. This setting does not affect the values of key-value lists coming from DB Server. That is, actual data is being presented exactly as in the database tables.

Note: For the Case Conversion option, use the default value (any) unless directed to do otherwise by Genesys Ewuxqo gt 'Ectg.

6. Click Save and Close to save the new DAP Application object.

End of procedure

To interface an application with a database through a certain DAP, add this DAP to the Application object's Connections list.

Procedure: Configuring a Database Access Point for Client DB Server using Configuration Manager

Prerequisites

- Configuration Manager is installed and running.
- Client DB Server is installed and running.

Start of procedure

- In Configuration Manager, right-click the Environment > Applications folder and select New > Application, which opens the Browse dialog box with the available application templates. If a DAP template file is not listed, do one of the following:
 - Import the Database_Access_Point_<current-version>.apd file from the Management Framework Product CD.
 - Create a new template using the instructions provided in the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*, and repeat this step.
- 2. In the Browse dialog box, select the DAP template file, and click OK, which opens the Properties dialog box for the new DAP Application object.
- 3. On the General tab:
 - Enter a descriptive name.

A DAP can have the same name as the database itself. However, it is recommended that you make their names unique if you are using multiple access points for the same database.

• In the DB Server field, use the Browse button to select the Application object corresponding to the DB Server that you just installed.

Note: Do not select the JDBC Connection check box when you configure Database Access Points.

- 4. On the DB Info tab, specify information about the database in the following fields:
 - DBMS Name—The name or alias identifying the DBMS that handles the database. The value of this option is communicated to DB Server so that it connects to the correct DBMS:
 - For DB2, set this value to the name or alias-name of the database specified in the db2 client configuration.
 - For Informix, this value is the name of SQL server, specified in the sqlhosts file.
 - For Microsoft SQL, set this value to the SQL server name (usually the same as the host name of the computer on which Microsoft SQL runs).
 - For Oracle, the value is the name of the Listener service.
 - For PostgreSQL, set this value to the SQL server name (usually the same as the host name of the computer on which PostgreSQL runs).
 - For Sybase, this value is the server name stored in the Sybase interface file.
 - DBMS Type—The type of DBMS that handles the database. You must set a value for this property.
 - Database Name—The name of the database to be accessed, as it is specified in the DBMS that handles this database. You must set a value for this property unless oracle or db2 is specified as the DBMS Type. For Sybase, Informix, and Microsoft SQL, this value is the name of the database to which the client will connect.
 - User Name—The user name established in the SQL server to access the database. You must set a value for this property.
 - Password—The password established in the SQL server to access the database.
 - Re-enter Password—Confirmation for the value entered for Password.
 - Case Conversion—Case conversion method for key names of key-value lists coming from DB Server. This value specifies whether and how a client application converts the field names of a database table when receiving data from DB Server. If you select upper, field names are converted into uppercase; if you select lower, field names are converted into lowercase; and if you select any, field names are not converted. This setting does not affect the values of key-value lists coming from DB Server. That is, actual data is being presented exactly as in the database tables.

Note: For the Case Conversion option, use the default value (any) unless directed to do otherwise by Genesys Ewuxqo gt'Ectg.

Note: Do not configure any properties on the JDBC Info tab when configuring a DAP application for the Management Layer.

- 5. On the Server Info tab:
 - Click the Browse button next to the Host drop-down list, and select the host on which this DB Server will run.
 - Specify the listening port(s) and select whether each is secure or not secure. Refer to the *Genesys Security Deployment Guide* for detailed information on specifying ports and securing connections to them.

End of procedure

To interface an application with a database through a certain DAP, add this DAP to the Application object's Connections list.

Installing DB Server

This section describes how to install DB Server on UNIX and Windows operating systems after you've configured it using Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager.

Procedure: Installing Client DB Server on UNIX

Prerequisites

• An Application object exists for this DB Server. See "Configuring DB Server" on page 15.

Start of procedure

- On the Management Framework 8.1 product CD in the services_layer/dbserver/[operating_system] directory, locate a shell script called install.sh.
- Run this script from the command prompt by typing the sh command and the file name. For example: sh install.sh
- 3. When prompted, specify the Host Name of the computer on which DB Server is to be installed.
- 4. Type n when asked whether this DB Server will provide access to the Configuration Database.
- 5. When prompted, specify the:
 - Host Name of the computer on which Configuration Server is running.

- Port used by client applications to connect to Configuration Server.
- User Name used to log in to the Configuration Layer.
- Password used to log in to the Configuration Layer.
- 6. The installation displays the list of Application objects of DB Server type configured for this Host. Type the number of the DB Server Application that you want installed.
- 7. Specify the destination directory into which DB Server is to be installed, with the full path to it.
- 8. The installation displays the names of the DB client processes for different types of SQL servers. Type the number of the DB client process name that should be configured.

As soon as the installation process is finished, a message appears announcing that installation was successful.

End of procedure

Procedure: Installing Client DB Server on Windows

Prerequisites

• An Application object exists for this DB Server. See "Configuring DB Server" on page 15.

Start of procedure

- 1. From the Management Framework 8.1 product CD, open the services_layer\dbserver\windows directory.
- 2. Locate and double-click Setup.exe to start installation.
- **3.** When prompted, select the option of running DB Server as a Configuration Server client.
- 4. When prompted, specify the:
 - Host Name of the computer on which Configuration Server is running.
 - Port used by client applications to connect to Configuration Server.
 - User Name used to log in to the Configuration Layer.
 - Password used to log in to the Configuration Layer.
- 5. From the list of Application objects of type DB Server configured for this Host, select the DB Server Application to install.
- 6. Specify the destination directory in which you want DB Server installed.
- 7. When prompted, click Finish to complete the installation.

End of procedure

Starting DB Server

For complete instructions on starting and stopping DB Server, refer to the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide*.

Note that when you start the DB Server through the Management Layer, the server inherits environment variables from the Local Control Agent (LCA) component, which executes the startup command. That means you must also set the environment variables required for DB Server for the account that runs LCA. See Chapter 2, "DBMS Environment Settings," on page 27 for more information.

Warning! Always restart DB Server when restarting your DBMS server.

DBMS Environment Settings

To work with a DBMS client, DB Server requires particular environment settings. This chapter lists those settings for each database type.

In addition to the recommendations in this chapter, refer to the DBMS vendor's documentation.

General Recommendations

Genesys DB clients for Solaris, AIX, and Tru64 UNIX operating systems might require the environment variable LD_LIBRARY_PATH (for Solaris and Tru64 UNIX) or LIBPATH (on AIX) environment variable for startup. Set this variable and specify a path to the DBMS client libraries.

The 64-bit DB client for the 64-bit version of the Solaris operating system might require the LD_LIBRARY_PATH_64 environment variable for startup. Set this variable and specify a path to the DBMS client libraries.

The DB client for the HP-UX operating system might require the SHLIB_PATH environment variable for startup. Set this variable and specify a path to the DBMS client libraries.

Additional recommendations for your database system are given throughout this chapter.

Genesys DB Client for Sybase

You must set the environment variables SYBASE and DSQUERY for DB client for Sybase.

When you create a call to the stored procedure in Interaction Router Designer, you can omit the [®] prefix normally required by Sybase when specifying parameter names.

For more information, refer to the Sybase documentation.

Table 1 lists additional configuration requirements specific to various operating systems; that is, a name and a value of an environment variable that you must define.

If you are using IMAGE data on Sybase for reading or writing, Genesys also recommends the following:

- To optimize the performance of DB Server, limit the size of the IMAGE to 1 MB or less.
- Set the following configuration options to the specified values on your Sybase server:

abort tran on log full = true trunc log on chkpt = true

Genesys DB Client for Oracle

You must set the following environment variables for DB client for Oracle:

ORACLE_HOME

ORACLE_SID

In addition, you must specify the full path to the bin of the Oracle home directory in the PATH variable.

If the DBMS client for Oracle runs on any host other than the Oracle server, you must configure the SQLNet on both hosts. Note that a TCP/IP Adapter is also required.

For more information, refer to the Oracle documentation.

Genesys DB Client for MS SQL

When you create a call to the stored procedure in Interaction Router Designer, you can now omit the [®] prefix normally required by MS SQL when specifying parameter names.

For more information, refer to the MS SQL documentation.

No additional configuration is required for the DB client for MS SQL.

Genesys DB Client for Informix

For DB client for Informix you must set the following environment variables with the full path to the Informix home directory and with the name of the Informix server:

INFORMIXDIR

INFORMIXSERVER

For Informix version 10.0, you must install Informix Client SDK and set the INFORMIXDIR environment variable with the full path to the Client SDK home directory.

For more information refer to Informix's *Online Dynamic Server User's Guide*.

Genesys DB Client for DB2

You must set the DB2INSTANCE and INSTHOME variables for DB client for DB2. In addition, you must specify the full path to the bin, adm, and misc of the DB2 home directory in the PATH variable. For more information, refer to DB2 documentation.

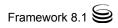

Setting Configuration Options

Unless specified otherwise, set DB Server configuration options in the options of the DB Server Application object, using one of the following navigation paths:

- In Genesys Administrator—DB Server Application object > Options tab > Advanced View (Options)
- In Configuration Manager—DB Server Application object > Properties dialog box > Options tab

Warning! Configuration section names, configuration option names, and predefined option values are case-sensitive. Type them in Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager exactly as they are documented in this chapter.

Mandatory Options

Table 6 lists the DB Server options for which you must provide values;otherwise, DB Server will not start. The options are listed by section.

dbserver Section

This section must be called dbserver.

client_stop_timeout

Default Value: 30 Valid Values: Any positive integer from 0–65535 Changes Take Effect: After restart Specifies the interval, in seconds, that DB Server waits for a client to stop before DB Server terminates the DB client process.

connect_break_time

Default Value: 1200 Valid Values: Any positive integer Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies a timeout, in seconds, after which DB Server closes a connection to a DB client if DB Server could not send a request to the client. Do not set this option too small; if a value of 1 to 10 seconds is set, for example, network delay might prevent a request delivery. Genesys recommends that you set this option to a value equal to or greater than 60.

db-request-timeout

Default Value: 0 Valid Values: 0–604800 (in seconds, equivalent to 0 seconds–7 days) Changes Take Effect: After DB Server reconnects to the database; no restart is required.

Specifies the period of time, in seconds, that it should take one DBMS request to be completed. If a request to the DBMS takes longer than this period of time, the database client process stops executing, and DB Server interprets this as a DBMS failure.

DB Server uses this option for all started database client processes, unless overwritten by the value of the db-request-timeout option in the annex of a Database Access Point (DAP) object.

If this option is set to the default value of 0 (zero), no timeout is used.

Note: This option applies only to DB Servers that provide access to databases other than the Configuration Database. In other words, do not use this option for the Configuration DB Server.

db2_name

Default Value: ./dbclient_db2 Valid Values:

./dbclient_db2	Strongly recommended.
./dbclient_db2_32	Use this value only if it is clearly indicated that you use the 32-bit DB Server client.
./dbclient_db2_64	Use this value only if it is clearly indicated that you use the 64-bit DB Server client.

Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the name of the DB Server client process for the DB2 server. This option is required for DB2 databases. Also see dbprocess_name.

dbprocess_name

Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the type of DB client process, based on the DBMS being used. This
option works with dbprocesses_per_client and the corresponding
<DBMS>_name option (that is, db2_name, informix_name, msql_name, oracle_name,
postgre_name, or sybase_name).

Note: Enable this option only for compatibility with previous releases of client applications (5.1, 6.0, or 6.1).

dbprocess_number

Default Value: 255 Valid Values:

- 0 Does not restrict the number of running DB Client processes
- 1 and above Sets the maximum number of simultaneously running DB Client processes

Changes Take Effect: After restart

Sets the maximum limit for the number of simultaneously running DB Client processes.

dbprocesses_per_client

Default Value: 1 Valid Values: Any positive integer from 1–255 Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the number of database client processes that DB Server's main process creates for each client if a user client does not make an explicit request. This option prioritizes client access to the database. For example, if multiple processes per client are set, DB Server spawns another child process if needed. This effectively gives the client application more of the database's processing time. See documentation for a particular client application to verify whether that application supports the Multiple Processes mode. If unsure of the appropriate number, set this option to 1. Increasing the value up to 4 increases performance; more than 4 does not increase performance.

Note: Genesys recommends using the default value (1) for this option unless instructed otherwise by Ewuxqo gt 'Ectg'or by the user's guide of the applicable Genesys solution. Changing the default value (1) of this option may cause data loss.

informix_name

Default Value: ./dbclient_informix Valid Values: ./dbclient_informix Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the name of the DB Server client process for the Informix server if present. **This option is required for Informix databases.** Also see dbprocess_name.

management-port

Default Value: 4051 Valid Values: Any valid TCP/IP port Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the TCP/IP port DB Server reserves for connections established by its SNMP (Simple Network Management Protocol) Option Management Client.

msql_name

Default Value: ./dbclient_msql Valid Values: ./dbclient_msql Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the name of the DB Server client process for the Microsoft SQL server. **This option is required for MSSQL databases.** Also see dbprocess_name.

oracle_name

Default Value: ./dbclient_oracle Valid Values:

./dbclient_oracle	Strongly recommended.
./dbclient_oracle_32	Use this value only if it is clearly indicated that you use the 32-bit DB Server client.
./dbclient_oracle_64	Use this value only if it is clearly indicated that you use the 64-bit DB Server client.

Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the name of the DB Server client process for the Oracle server if present. **This option is required for Oracle databases.** Also see dbprocess_name.

postgre_name

Default Value: ./dbclient_postgre Valid Values: ./dbclient_postgre Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the name of the DB Server client process for the PostgreSQL server if present. **This option is required for PostgreSQL databases.** Also see dbprocess_name.

stored_proc_result_table

Default Value: No default value Valid Values: Any valid table name Changes Take Effect: After restart

Used by earlier versions of DB Server that do not directly retrieve output data from stored procedures. This option specifies the name of a table that you design, to which a stored procedure that you have created writes output data (the maximum allowed size of an output parameter from a stored procedure is 2000 B). DB Server then retrieves the data stored in the specified table and sends it to the user application. Using a result table can slow down DB Server, because each stored procedure call causes an additional select statement.

sybase_name

Default Value: ./dbclient_sybase Valid Values: ./dbclient_sybase Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies the name of the DB Server client process for the Sybase server if present. **This option is required for Sybase databases.** Also see dbprocess_name.

tran_batch_mode

Default Value: off Valid Values: on, off Changes Take Effect: After restart

Valid only for Sybase databases. If set to on, DB Server executes all transactions as SQL batches, which increases performance for insert and update statements.

Note:	Genesys recommends using the default value (off) for this option
	unless instructed otherwise by Ewropo gt'Ectg or by the user's guide
	of the applicable Genesys solution.

verbose

Default Value: 3 Valid Values:

0	DB Server writes no debug messages.
1	DB Server writes errors and SQL statements.
2	DB Server writes information about all messages it has received
	and sent.
3	DB Server writes debug messages at the most detailed level.
Changes Take Effect: After restart	

Sets the level of detail with which DB Server writes the debug messages. The option is configured in the dbserver section and is enabled only when the verbose option in the log section is set to either all or debug. DB Server writes the debug messages to a log output specified for the all and/or debug log output options.

Note: Although named the same, the verbose options in the log and dbserver sections are responsible for different types of log settings.

Transport Parameter Options

Set options in this section in the Transport Parameters of the port's properties, using one of the following navigation paths:

- In Genesys Administrator—DB Server Application object > Configuration tab > General section > Connections > Connection Info > Advanced tab > Transport Parameters

Transport Parameter options are not associated with a configuration option section, and do not appear in the options or annex of a DB Server Application object.

transport In a configuration file, these options appear in the following format:

transport = <option name>=<value>; <option name>=<value>; ...

Collectively, the options make up the parameters of the transport option. When entering the options in Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager, only the options are required; transport = is prefixed automatically to the list of option/value pairs.

Note: Valid values for these options must have no spaces before or after the delimiter characters ";" (semi-colin) and "=".

tls

Setting Configuration Options

Refer to the description of the particular option for information about where to set its value. Configuration section names, configuration option names, and predefined option values are case-sensitive. Type them in Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager exactly as they are documented in this chapter.

Mandatory Options

You do not have to configure any options for a Database Access Point.

default Section

This section must be called default.

db-request-timeout

Default Value: 0 Valid Values: 0–604800 (in seconds, equivalent to 0 seconds–7 days) Changes Take Effect: After DB Server reconnects to the database; no restart is required.

Specifies the period of time, in seconds, that it should take one DBMS request to be completed. If a request to the DBMS takes longer than this period of time, the database client process stops executing, and DB Server interprets this as a DBMS failure.

This option overrides the value of the db-request-timeout option specified by DB Server, for this Database Access Point only.

If this option is set to the default value of 0 (zero), the value of the db-request-timeout option configured in DB Server is used.

Setting this You can configure this option in any of the following locations:

utf8-ucs2

This option applies only if you are working with an MS SQL Log Database that has been initialized as a multi-language database. MS SQL uses UCS-2 encoding instead of UTF-8. Setting this option to true forces the transcoding of UTF-8 to UCS-2 encoding before writing to the MS SQL database, and the transcoding of UCS-2 to UTF-8 encoding after reading from the database. Therefore, the MS SQL database is able to work with other components encoded using UTF-8.

Setting this Option

Set this option only in Genesys Administrator, as the following location:

 Database Access Point Application object > Options tab > Advanced View (Annex) You cannot configure this option in Configuration Manager. Multi-language functionality is available only in Genesys Administrator.

Setting Configuration Options

Unless specified otherwise, set common configuration options in the options of the Application object, using one of the following navigation paths:

 In Genesys Administrator—Application object > Options tab > Advanced View (Options)

Note: Some server applications also support log options that are unique to them. For descriptions of a particular application's unique log options, refer to the chapter/document about that application.

- In Configuration Manager—Application object > Properties dialog box > Options tab
- **Warning!** Configuration section names, configuration option names, and predefined option values are case-sensitive. Type them in Genesys Administrator or Configuration Manager exactly as they are documented in this chapter.

Mandatory Options

You do not have to configure any common options to start Server applications.

Common Log Options

This section contains all options relating to creating, viewing, and otherwise using the Centralized Log facility in Genesys software.

log Section

This section must be called Log.

Warning! For applications configured via a configuration file, changes to log options take effect after the application is restarted.

buffering

Default Value: true

Valid Values:

true Enables buffering.

false Disables buffering.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Turns on/off operating system file buffering. The option is applicable only to the stderr and stdout output (see page 52). Setting this option to true increases the output performance.

Note: When buffering is enabled, there might be a delay before log messages appear at the console.

check-point

Default Value: 1 Valid Values: 0–24 Changes Take Effect: Immediately Specifies, in hours, how often the application generates a check point log event, to divide the log into sections of equal time. By default, the application generates this log event every hour. Setting the option to 0 prevents the generation of check-point events.

compatible-output-priority

Default Value: false Valid Values

true The log of the level specified by "Log Output Options" is sent to the specified output.

false The log of the level specified by "Log Output Options" and higher levels is sent to the specified output.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies whether the application uses 6.x output logic. For example, you configure the following options in the Log section for a 6.x application and for a 7.x application:

verbose = all
debug = file1
standard = file2
```

The log file content of a 6.x application is as follows:

- file1 contains Debug messages only.
- file2 contains Standard messages only.

The log file content of a 7.x application is as follows:

- file1 contains Debug, Trace, Interaction, and Standard messages.
- file2 contains Standard messages only.

If you set compatible-output-priority to true in the 7.x application, its log file content will be the same as for the 6.x application.

Warning! Genesys does not recommend changing the default value of this option unless you have specific reasons to use the 6.x log output logic—that is, to mimic the output priority as implemented in releases 6.x. Setting this option to true affects log consistency.

expire

Default Value: false
Valid Values:

false	No expiration; all generated segments are stored.
<number> file or <number></number></number>	Sets the maximum number of log files to store. Specify a number from 1–1000.
≺number> day	Sets the maximum number of days before log files are deleted. Specify a number from 1–100.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Determines whether log files expire. If they do, sets the measurement for determining when they expire, along with the maximum number of files (segments) or days before the files are removed. This option is ignored if log output is not configured to be sent to a log file.

Note: If an option's value is set incorrectly—out of the range of valid values— it will be automatically reset to 10.

keep-startup-file

 Default Value: false

 Valid Values:

 false
 No startup segment of the log is kept.

 true
 A startup segment of the log is kept. The size of the segment equals the value of the segment option.

 <number> KB
 Sets the maximum size, in kilobytes, for a startup segment of the log.

 <number> MB
 Sets the maximum size, in megabytes, for a startup segment of the log.

Changes Take Effect: After restart

Specifies whether a startup segment of the log, containing the initial configuration options, is to be kept. If it is, this option can be set to true or to a specific size. If set to true, the size of the initial segment will be equal to the size of the regular log segment defined by the segment option. The value of this option will be ignored if segmentation is turned off (that is, if the segment option is set to false).

memory

Default Value: No default value Valid Values: <string> (memory file name) Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the name of the file to which the application regularly prints a snapshot of the memory output, if it is configured to do this (see "Log Output Options" on page 52). The new snapshot overwrites the previously written data. If the application terminates abnormally, this file will contain the latest log messages. Memory output is not recommended for processors with a CPU frequency lower than 600 MHz.

Note: If the file specified as the memory file is located on a network drive, an application does not create a snapshot file (with the extension *.memory.log). Log output to a file at a network location is not recommended and could cause performance degradation.

memory-storage-size

Default Value: 2 MB

Valid Values:

<number> KB or <number></number></number>	The size of the memory output, in kilobytes. The minimum value is 128 KB.
<number> MB</number>	The size of the memory output, in megabytes. The maximum value is 64 MB.

Changes Take Effect: When memory output is created

Specifies the buffer size for log output to the memory, if configured. See also "Log Output Options" on page 52.

message_format

Default Value: short

Valid Values:

- short An application uses compressed headers when writing log records in its log file.
- full An application uses complete headers when writing log records in its log file.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the format of log record headers that an application uses when writing logs in the log file. Using compressed log record headers improves application performance and reduces the log file's size.

With the value set to short:

- A header of the log file or the log file segment contains information about the application (such as the application name, application type, host type, and time zone), whereas single log records within the file or segment omit this information.
- A log message priority is abbreviated to Std, Int, Trc, or Dbg, for Standard, Interaction, Trace, or Debug messages, respectively.
- The message ID does not contain the prefix GCTI or the application type ID.

A log record in the full format looks like this:

2002-05-07T18:11:38.196 Standard localhost cfg_dbserver GCTI-00-05060 Application started

A log record in the short format looks like this:

2002-05-07T18:15:33.952 Std 05060 Application started

Note: Whether the full or short format is used, time is printed in the format specified by the time_format option.

messagefile

Default Value: As specified by a particular application Valid Values: <string>. Lms (message file name) Changes Take Effect: Immediately, if an application cannot find its *. Lms file at startup Specifies the file name for application-specific log events. The name must be valid for the operating system on which the application is running. The option value can also contain the absolute path to the application-specific *. Ims file. Otherwise, an application looks for the file in its working directory.

Warning! An application that does not find its *. Ims file at startup cannot generate application-specific log events and send them to Message Server.

print-attributes

Default Value: false Valid Values:

true Attaches extended attributes, if any exist, to a log event sent to log output.

false Does not attach extended attributes to a log event sent to log output.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies whether the application attaches extended attributes, if any exist, to a log event that it sends to log output. Typically, log events of the Interaction log level and Audit-related log events contain extended attributes. Setting this option to true enables audit capabilities, but negatively affects performance. Genesys recommends enabling this option for Solution Control Server and Configuration Server when using audit tracking. For other applications, refer to *Genesys Combined Log Events Help* to find out whether an application generates Interaction-level and Audit-related log events; if it does, enable the option only when testing new interaction scenarios.

segment

Default Value: false Valid Values:

No segmentation is allowed.
Sets the maximum segment size, in kilobytes. The minimum segment size is 100 KB.
Sets the maximum segment size, in megabytes.
Sets the number of hours for the segment to stay open. The minimum number is 1 hour.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies whether there is a segmentation limit for a log file. If there is, sets the mode of measurement, along with the maximum size. If the current log segment exceeds the size set by this option, the file is closed and a new one is created. This option is ignored if log output is not configured to be sent to a log file.

spool

Default Value: The application's working directory

Valid Values: $\langle path \rangle$ (the folder, with the full path to it) Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the folder, including full path to it, in which an application creates temporary files related to network log output. If you change the option value while the application is running, the change does not affect the currently open network output.

time convert

Default Value: Local Valid Values:

local	The time of log record generation is expressed as a local time, based
	on the time zone and any seasonal adjustments. Time zone
	information of the application's host computer is used.
utc	The time of log record generation is expressed as Coordinated Universal Time (UTC).

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the system in which an application calculates the log record time when generating a log file. The time is converted from the time in seconds since the Epoch (00:00:00 UTC, January 1, 1970).

time format

Default Value: time Valid Values:

time	The time string is formatted according to the HH:MM:SS.sss (hours, minutes, seconds, and milliseconds) format.
locale	The time string is formatted according to the system's locale.
IS08601	The date in the time string is formatted according to the ISO 8601 format. Fractional seconds are given in milliseconds.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies how to represent, in a log file, the time when an application generates log records.

A log record's time field in the ISO 8601 format looks like this: 2001-07-24T04:58:10.123

verbose

Default Value: all Valid Values:

all	All log events (that is, log events of the Standard, Trace, Interaction, and Debug levels) are generated.
debug	The same as all.
trace	Log events of the Trace level and higher (that is, log events of the Standard, Interaction, and Trace levels) are generated, but log events of the Debug level are not generated.

interaction	Log events of the Interaction level and higher (that is, log events of the Standard and Interaction levels) are generated, but log events of the Trace and Debug levels are not generated.
standard	Log events of the Standard level are generated, but log events of the Interaction, Trace, and Debug levels are not generated.
none	No output is produced.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Determines whether a log output is created. If it is, specifies the minimum level of log events generated. The log events levels, starting with the highest priority level, are Standard, Interaction, Trace, and Debug. See also "Log Output Options" on page 52.

Note: For definitions of the Standard, Interaction, Trace, and Debug log levels, refer to the *Framework Management Layer User's Guide*, *Framework Genesys Administrator Help*, or to *Framework Solution Control Interface Help*.

Log Output Options

To configure log outputs, set log level options (all, alarm, standard, interaction, trace, and/or debug) to the desired types of log output (stdout, stderr, network, memory, and/or [filename], for log file output).

You can use:

- One log level option to specify different log outputs.
- One log output type for different log levels.
- Several log output types simultaneously, to log events of the same or different log levels.

You must separate the log output types by a comma when you are configuring more than one output for the same log level. See "Examples" on page 56.

Warnings!	•	If you direct log output to a file on the network drive, an
		application does not create a snapshot log file (with the
		extension *.snapshot.log) in case it terminates abnormally.

• Directing log output to the console (by using the stdout or stderr settings) can affect application performance. Avoid using these log output settings in a production environment.

Note: The log output options are activated according to the setting of the verbose configuration option.

all

Default Value: No default value Valid Values (log output types):

stdout Log events are sent to the Standard output (stdout).

stderr	Log events are sent to the Standard error output (stderr).
network	Log events are sent to Message Server, which can reside anywhere on the network. Message Server stores the log events in the Log Database.
	Setting the all log level option to the network output enables an application to send log events of the Standard, Interaction, and Trace levels to Message Server. Debug-level log events are neither sent to Message Server nor stored in the Log Database.
memory	Log events are sent to the memory output on the local disk. This is the safest output in terms of the application performance.
[filename]	Log events are stored in a file with the specified name. If a path is not specified, the file is created in the application's working directory.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the outputs to which an application sends all log events. The log output types must be separated by a comma when more than one output is configured. For example:

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the outputs to which an application sends the log events of the Debug level and higher (that is, log events of the Standard, Interaction, Trace, and Debug levels). The log output types must be separated by a comma when more than one output is configured—for example:

debug = stderr, /usr/local/genesys/logfile

Note: Debug-level log events are never sent to Message Server or stored in the Log Database.

Log File Extensions

You can use the following file extensions to identify log files that an application creates for various types of output:

- *.log—Assigned to log files when you configure output to a log file. For example, if you set standard = confservlog for Configuration Server, it prints log messages into a text file called confservlog.<time_stamp>.log.
- *.qsp—Assigned to temporary (spool) files when you configure output to the network but the network is temporarily unavailable. For example, if

you set standard = network for Configuration Server, it prints log messages into a file called confserv.<time_stamp>.qsp during the time the network is not available.

*.snapshot.log—Assigned to files that contain the output snapshot when you configure output to a log file. The file contains the last log messages that an application generates before it terminates abnormally. For example, if you set standard = confservlog for Configuration Server, it prints the last log message into a file called confserv.<time_stamp>.snapshot.log in case of failure.

Note: Provide *.snapshot.log files to Genesys Ewuxqo gt 'Ectg when reporting a problem.

*.memory.log—Assigned to log files that contain the memory output snapshot when you configure output to memory and redirect the most recent memory output to a file. For example, if you set standard = memory and memory = confserv for Configuration Server, it prints the latest memory output to a file called confserv.<time_stamp>.memory.log.

Examples

This section presents examples of a log section that you might configure for an application when that application is operating in production mode and in two lab modes, debugging and troubleshooting.

Production Mode Log Section

[log] verbose = standard standard = network, logfile

With this configuration, an application only generates the log events of the Standard level and sends them to Message Server, and to a file named Logfile, which the application creates in its working directory. Genesys recommends that you use this or a similar configuration in a production environment.

Warning! Directing log output to the console (by using the stdout or stderr settings) can affect application performance. Avoid using these log output settings in a production environment.

Lab Mode Log Section

With this configuration, an application generates log events of the Standard, Interaction, Trace, and Debug levels, and sends them to the standard output and to a file named Logfile, which the application creates in the /usr/local/genesys/ directory. In addition, the application sends log events of the Standard, Interaction, and Trace levels to Message Server. Use this configuration to test new interaction scenarios in a lab environment.

Failure-Troubleshooting Log Section

With this configuration, an application generates log events of the Standard level and sends them to Message Server. It also generates log events of the Standard, Interaction, Trace, and Debug levels, and sends them to the memory output. The most current log is stored to a file named Logfile, which the application creates in its working directory. Increased memory storage allows an application to save more of the log information generated before a failure...

Note: If you are running an application on UNIX, and you do not specify any files in which to store the memory output snapshot, a core file that the application produces before terminating contains the most current application log. Provide the application's core file to Genesys Ewuxqo gt" Ectg'when reporting a problem.

Debug Log Options

The options in this section enable you to generate Debug logs containing information about specific operations of an application.

These options can be deactivated with option Level-reassign-disable option.

Warning!	Use caution when making these changes in a production environment.
	Depending on the log configuration, changing the log level to a higher priority may cause the log event to be logged more often or to a greater number of outputs. This could affect system performance.
	Likewise, changing the log level to a lower priority may cause the log event to be not logged at all, or to be not logged to specific outputs, thereby losing important information. The same applies to any alarms associated with that log event.

In addition to the preceding warning, take note of the following:

- Logs can be customized only by release 7.6 (or later) applications.
- When the log level of a log event is changed to any level except none, it is subject to the other settings in the [log] section at its new level. If set to none, it is not logged and is therefore not subject to any log configuration.
- Using this feature to change the log level of a log changes only its priority; it does not change how that log is treated by the system. For example,

increasing the priority of a log to Alarm level does not mean that an alarm will be associated with it.

- Each application in a High Availability (HA) pair can define its own unique set of log customizations, but the two sets are not synchronized with each other. This can result in different log behavior depending on which application is currently in primary mode.
- This feature is not the same as a similar feature in Universal Routing Server (URS) release 7.2 (or later). In this Framework feature, the priority of log events are customized. In the URS feature, the priority of debug messages only are customized. Refer to the *Universal Routing Reference Manual* for more information about the URS feature.
- You cannot customize any log event that is not in the unified log record format. Log events of the Alarm, Standard, Interaction, and Trace levels feature the same unified log record format.

Example

This is an example of using customized log level settings, subject to the following log configuration:

- Log event 1020, with default level standard, is output to stderr and log_file, and sent to Message Server.

- Log event 4020, with default level debug, is output to stderr.

Common Security Options

Common security options are used to implement some security features in Genesys software. These options are configured on supporting Application objects.

Filtering and/or Tagging Data in Logs

log-filter Section

The log-filter section contains configuration options used to define the default treatment of filtering data in log output. Specifically, it defines the treatment of all KV pairs in the AttributeUserData section of the log.

This section must be called log-filter.

If the string is includes a blank space or any of the characters, (comma), (, or) as start and stop characters, they will not be counted as part of the length of the string.

- unhide-first, <n> The keys of the KVList pairs in the AttributeUserData section are copied to the log; all but the first <n> characters of the value are replaced with asterisks. If <n> exceeds the number of characters in the value, the value of the key appears, with no asterisks.
- unhide-last, <n> The keys of the KVList pairs in the AttributeUserData section are copied to the log; all but the last <n> characters of the value are replaced with asterisks. If <n> exceeds the number of characters in the key, the value of the key appears, with no asterisks.

Changes Take Effect: Immediately

Specifies the default way of presenting KVList information (including UserData, Extensions, and Reasons) in the log. This setting will be applied to the attributes of all KVList pairs in the AttributeUserData section except those that are explicitly defined in the log-filter-data section.

Refer to the "Hide Selected Data in Logs" chapter in the *Genesys Security Deployment Guide* for information about how to use this option.

filtering

Enables (true) or disables (false) log filtering at the Application level.

Refer to application-specific documentation to determine what thread classes, if any, are used.

dbserver Section

In addition to options specific to an application that may exist in this section, this section also contains an option to support Oracle 11g RAC in TAF mode. When this option is set, Configuration Server can resubmit DML statements (DML transactions or binding package execution) when the appropriate error messages are received from the DBMS. For more information, refer to the *Framework Deployment Guide*.

This section must be called dbserver.

dml-retry

Note: If the client application servers are in an HA pair, the port and backup-port values will be propagated from the primary server to the backup. As a result, after switchover, these ports will be in use by another server, so the new primary client application will be unable to open and use them.

To prevent this, Genesys recommends that you do one of the following:

- Locate the backup pair on different hosts.
- Manually change the port and backup-port settings for the backup server.

Configuring Secure Connections Using Security Certificates

The options in this section are used to define the use of security certificates and configuring secure connections between components. Refer to the chapter "Genesys TLS Configuration" in the *Genesys Security Deployment Guide* for more information about security certificates, configuring secure connections, and TLS security.

Unless otherwise stated, set options in this section in the Transport Parameters of the port's properties, using one of the following navigation paths:

- In Genesys Administrator—Application object > Configuration tab > General section > Connections > Connection Info > Advanced tab > Transport Parameters
- In Configuration Manager—Application object > Properties dialog box > Connection tab > Connection Properties dialog box > Advanced tab > Transport Protocol Parameters

cipher-list

Specifies the defined list of ciphers. The cipher list must be in a valid format. See the chapter "Genesys TLS Configuration" in the *Genesys Security Deployment Guide* for information about cipher formatting rules and examples of valid cipher strings.

client-auth

Specifies whether authentication of the security certificate in the client TLS socket is to be disabled. When set to 1 (default), authentication is enabled. When set to 0, the client socket does not authenticate the server when connected over TLS.

This option must be set at the same level where the certificate itself is configured. Use this option if the security certificate is configured at the port level. If it is configured at another level, do one of the following:

- If the security certificate is configured at the application level, see page 65.
- If the security certificate is configured at the host level, set this option at the host level.

Note: If this option is configured at multiple levels (connection, application, host), the value set at the lowest level takes precedence. That is:

- The value set at the connection level takes precedence over the value set at the application and host levels.
- The value set at the application level takes precedence over the value set at the host level.

crl





- The DB Server executable file multiserver (on the Tru64 UNIX and Linux operating systems) or multiserver_32 and multiserver_64 (on other UNIX operating systems)
 - **Note:** The installation script makes a link to the appropriate executable file, so that a user need only specify multiserver as the executable file name.
- DB client files for all supported DBMS types, as specified in Table 10.

Troubleshooting DB Server

This appendix contains answers to frequently asked questions about DB Server as well as some information about troubleshooting common problems. Look through this information before contacting Genesys Customer Care with your questions and problems.

This appendix contains two sections:

Frequently Asked Questions

Question:

If I change the port of my MS SQL server, how do I connect DB Server?

Answer:

If you change the port of the MS SQL database, then you need to make the following changes in both the Client Network Utility and the Server Network Utility programs in MS SQL:

- On the General tab on the Client Network Utility, ensure that TCP/IP is enabled and click Properties. Enter the new port number and repeat this procedure on the Server Network Utility.
- Save the changes and restart DB Server.

Question:

What is the character limit for the stored procedure parameter?

Answer:

The maximum number of characters for processes are as follows:

- Parameter name: 64 bytes
- Number of parameters: 255
- Input/Output parameter limits: 2 KB
- The SQL statement passed from router to DB Server: 10240 bytes

Question:

What causes the error Unresolved symbol: getrLimit64(code) in the DB Server log?

Answer:

Generally, this error message is caused either by a mismatch between DB Server and the OS version (for instance, running a 32-bit DB Server on a 64-bit OS), or by using an outdated DB Server patch.

Question:

Why does DB Server seem to be losing 50% or more of all data writes?

Answer:

To date, only Universal Routing Server (Interaction Router) is capable of handling multiple database processes simultaneously; DB Server client (for example, Call Concentrator) can only handle one process. Therefore, you must set the DB Server option dbprocesses_per_client to 1.

Question:

What shutdown sequence for DB Server should I use to avoid problems?

Answer:

The recommended sequence is to first shut down DB Server (if you are using the Backup feature, bring the backup down first, followed by the primary DB Server), and then shut down the database. When you restart, start the database first, and then start DB Server.

Question:

What should I do if DB Server cannot connect to our Informix database?

Answer:

This problem occurs when the variables INFORMIXDIR and INFORMIXSERVER do not specify the full path to the Informix home directory. The problem is

specific to Informix 7.1 and you can avoid it by upgrading to Informix 7.2. Consult your *Informix Server User's Guide* for details.

Question:

What do I do if DB Server cannot connect to the Informix database when I start the server as a Windows NT Service?

Answer:

This problem arises when the environment variables INFORMIXDIR and INFORMIXSERVER are not set in the computing environment of the person trying to start DB Server.

You can correct this by changing DB Server's service logon account from System Account to the user who is able to successfully start DB Server manually. To do this:

- 1. Open the Windows Control Panel and select Services.
- 2. Select the Genesys DB Server service.
- 3. Click Startup.
- 4. Select This Account in the Logon As section, and specify the username and password of the Windows NT user who is able to successfully start DB Server manually.

If you must start DB Server using System Account, contact your System or Database Administrator to correct your environment configuration.

Question:

What should I do if DB Server cannot connect to Oracle database and logs the following error:

ORA-12154 or TNS-12154 ?

Answer:

This error indicates that the Listener may be incorrectly configured in the tnsnames.ora file. Carefully check to ensure that the Listener is entered correctly in tnsnames.ora.

Question:

What should I do if DB Server cannot connect to an Oracle database and logs the following error:

ORA-12560 ?

Answer:

To correct this problem, check that the DBMS Name parameter specified in the Database Access Point Application object configured in the Configuration

Layer is correct—it must match the name of the Listener configured in the tnsnames.ora file. Note that the Database Name parameter, although mandatory for all other database types, is not required for Oracle and thus can be left blank.

Question:

What should I do if DB Server cannot connect to Oracle database and records the following error:

ORA-12203 or TNS-12203 ?

Answer:

To correct this problem, verify that the option dbserver in DB Server's client configuration matches the setting of the ORACLE_SID environment variable on the computer on which DB Server is running. It might also be helpful for you to analyze the sqlnet.log log file in the DB Server installation folder. This file is created by the Oracle Client in case there is a need to troubleshoot a network configuration problem.

Question:

What is DB Server's BLOB data size limit?

Answer:

DB Server can handle a maximum 10 MB.

Question:

Is it possible to start multiple DB Servers on the same computer?

Answer:

Yes, provided that they use separate ports.

However, when running multiple DB Server instances in the same UNIX environment, you must install the instances in different directories. In addition, the setting for the dbprocess_name option must begin with a period and a forward slash (./) (for example, ./process_name). This will ensure that DB Server starts the DB client from the current directory. Otherwise, the DB client may read the wrong configuration file and be unable to connect to the correct DB Server.

Question:

Is it possible to configure DB Server to automatically reconnect to a database after a database problem is corrected?

Answer:

DB Server connects to the database only when its client application sends a request to open the database. If the database is down for any reason, all such client requests fail, and DB Server notifies the client that the database is not available. The application must reconnect (and reopen the database) after receiving such an error.

Question:

How do I configure Automatic Disconnection Detection Protocol (ADDP) on DB Server?

Answer:

Genesys recommends enabling ADDP on the links between any pair of Genesys components. ADDP helps detect a connection failure on both the client and the server side. You configure ADDP in Genesys Administrator of Configuration Manager. For detailed instructions, refer to the *Framework 8.1 Deployment Guide, Framework 8.1 Genesys Administrator Help*, or *Framework 8.1 Configuration Manager Help*.

Troubleshooting Common Problems

This section discusses the solutions to several problems commonly encountered with DB Server.

Note: Set the value of the verbose option to 3 (see Chapter 3, "verbose," on page 38) when you are troubleshooting DB Server. This setting provides a detailed log that may indicate the source of a particular problem. After you resolve the problem, reset the verbose option to its previous level to increase performance.

Increase the Processes Allowed Limit in Windows

By default, Microsoft Windows limits each local system account to approximately 120 processes that are running as—or are started by—services. When the number of running processes reaches this limit, any attempt to start an additional process will fail. Because Windows counts DBClient processes which are started by DB Server, 120 can be too low a limit. One example of when this may happen is during Outbound deployment with a high number of calling lists.

To change the number of processes allowed, follow the procedure described in the Microsoft Knowledge Base article located here:

http://www.support.microsoft.com/?id=184802, which describes changing the registry value: HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\System\CurrentControlSet\Control\Session Manager\SubSystems\Windows

In this procedure, each additional 512 kilobytes that you specify in the third SharedSection parameter will allow approximately 120 additional processes/services to be started. The default SharedSection setting is highlighted in the default registry value data:

%SystemRoot%\system32\csrss.exe ObjectDirectory=\Windows SharedSection=1024,3072,512 Windows=On SubSystemType=Windows ServerDLL=basesrv,1 ServerDLL=winsrv:UserServerDLLInitialization,3 ServerDLL=winsrv:ConServerDLLInitialization,2 ProfileControl=Off MaxRequestThreads=16

Estimate the number of processes/services and apply it to the above calculation. Consider this example:

- 65 services are running under the local system account.
- You plan to start DB Server as a service under the local system account.
- You plan to use 60 connections from the Genesys DB Server to the DBMS.

These estimates require 125 services, which exceeds the default limit of 120. In this example, Genesys recommends that you to set the third SharedSection parameter to 1024, which increases the limit to 240. Use the Registry Editor to change the setting to this:

SharedSection=1024,3072,**1024**

Client Cannot Connect to DB Server

When a client connects to DB Server the following message is printed in the log:

DB Server - new client XX connected to server

If you see this message in the log, you are connecting properly. If it does not appear, it means the client is unable to connect to DB Server. In this case:

 Check that the DB Server host and port parameters specified in the Database Access Point Application object configured in the Configuration Layer (or the client's configuration file if the client has one) are correct. They must exactly match the host and port of DB Server as specified in the DB Server Application object configured in the Configuration Layer (or the DB Server configuration file).

- **Note:** Using localhost for the server defined in Configuration Layer may cause problems if DB Server and the client are not running on the same computer.
- Make sure that DB Server is listening on the port you have specified in the Configuration Layer (configuration file). Whenever DB Server starts, it prints the port used:

10/21/03 21:47:32.555 Trace KARADAG DBServerLog GCTI-00-04525 Port 7030 opened for Listening

- If it is not the port you have specified in the configuration, check the command line you used for startup.
- From the host of the client that cannot connect to DB Server, try to open a Telnet session to the DB Server host and port specified in the Database Access Point Application object configured in the Configuration Layer (or the client's configuration file if the client has one). If the Telnet connection fails, the problem lies in your network rather than in DB Server or the client. In this case, contact your Network Administrator.

DB Server Cannot Start the DB Client Process

If you see the following message in your log, there is a problem with starting DB client:

21:15:28.494 Std 05020 Cannot start process 'dbclient_oracle', error code 2

Error start dbclient process 'dbclient_oracle' type='2', copy='0' errno='No such file or directory'

- Make sure that the executable file specified in the log message does exist. Note that on some UNIX systems this name must be preceded by a period and a forward slash (./) to make it start from the current directory (for example, ./dbclient_oracle).
- Make sure that the user starting DB Server also has permission to start the DB client executable file.
- Try to start the DB client executable manually without the command-line argument.

DB Server Cannot Open the SQL Server Database

• Make sure the SQL Server client is properly installed and configured on the machine on which DB Server is running (see Chapter 5, "Deploying DB Server" on page 13 for more information).

• When DB Server tries to open the database, the following message appears in the log:

DBCLient 96 - Server: username = 'user', password = '**********', database = 'test', DB Server = 'cti'

Try to open the database manually (with the SQL Server client) using the values from the log message. If you can't do this, the problem lies with your SQL Server client configuration. In this case, contact your Database Administrator.

Request to Execute SQL Statement Fails

Check the log file for error messages. DB Server prints the error code and message the SQL Server returns. You may need to contact your Database Administrator for information on database-specific error codes.

Check the log for the text of the SQL command that fails. Try to execute the same command manually with SQL Server client, using the same username, password, and so on as specified in the Configuration Layer (configuration file).



Appendix

C

Installing and Configuring an Oracle Client

- **Notes:** This procedure can be used when DB Server is installed as either a standalone (it is used to access the Configuration Database) or as a client of Configuration Server.
 - This procedure is specific to installing Oracle 11.2 on the Linux platform.

To install and configure an Oracle client and make it work with DB Server, do the following, referring to Oracle documentation for details about the specific steps.

- Download and install the Oracle Instant Client Package Basic, version 11.2.0.4.0, from the Oracle web site: <u>http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/topics/linuxx86-64soft-092277.html</u> This installs the client into the /usr/lib/oracle/11.2/client64/ folder.
- **2.** Create a link to the client so that DB Server can find the library. Enter the following command on the Oracle command-line:

ln -s libclntsh.so.11.1 libclntsh.so

3. Create the tnsnames.ora file.

Note: If you are using a Linux user without a profile (for example, to run DB Server), place this file into the /etc folder.

- 4. In /etc/environment, set TNS_ADMIN=<location of tnsnames.ora file>.
- 5. Create the configuration file /etc/ld.so.conf.d/oracle-11.2-client64.conf containing the line LD_LIBRARY_PATH=/usr/lib/oracle/11.2/client64/lib.
- 6. Run Ldconfig.

7. Reboot the computer.
